

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY ASSISTANT

Occupational therapy is a vibrant, growing profession that makes it possible for people to achieve independence and live life to its fullest. By choosing a career as an occupational therapy assistant, you will work in multiple settings with people of all ages, from newborns to the elderly. You also will have a career that is in high demand! The projected job outlook for occupational therapy assistants, according to the U.S. Department of Labor Statistics, is expected to grow much faster than the average for all occupations. The starting salary for Washburn University's occupational therapy assistants is \$36,000 a year.



Occupational Therapy Assistant

Students earn a 68-credit-hour Associate of Science degree as they prepare to work in a variety of settings. For example, you may help children thrive in the "occupations" of childhood - learning, playing and growing. Graduates also may work in schools with students who have learning disabilities, behavioral problems, cerebral palsy or Down Syndrome. In addition, OTAs work with individuals in their homes, community centers, rehabilitation hospitals and nursing homes. They help people with traumatic injuries, stroke or Alzheimer's disease.

Students learn how to use equipment and apply the specialized techniques of occupational therapy as well as physiology and pathology. They study in the classroom and gain hands-on, clinical experience through on-the-job training in local health care and community settings. Students also have access to the Regional Simulation Center (RSC) at Washburn Tech. The facility is a new, state-of-the-art health care training lab that resembles an acute health care setting with the newest innovative technology.

Admissions requirements and packets may be found at www.washburn.edu/ota. Completed packets must be received by Feb. 1 for the next fall semester. Applications received after that date will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

Getting Started

Candidates must apply to Washburn University if they are currently not a student. You also must submit a complete OTA application to the program director and include transcripts. Acceptance to Washburn University does not guarantee acceptance to the OTA program.
